Most of us felt some identification with, or attraction to, more than one of these, but the favourites seemed to be the Body of Christ, the Rock and Pilgrim People. Some, though, were not comfortable with any of them! It would be fascinating to explore this further because our understanding of what the Church is, and is about, will be important in our coming explorations of what will happen to ministry in our congregations in Cardiff.

Consultation meetings with the other URC churches in Cardiff took place last week, and Beulah was represented at each by a group of Elders and Stephen Best. It is too early to know what will the next steps will be, but we will keep the congregation informed, and Church Meeting will, of course, be the place full discussion of for any recommendations.

And if we respond, there is God amongst and beyond us.

Training for Learning and Serving (TLS)

A few people have asked recently what opportunities there are in the URC for training in various areas of church life. Richard and Sarah Edwards are currently taking a TLS course with a view to becoming lay preachers. TLS will be changing over the next few years, but there are other options available involving differing levels of time and commitment. The following paragraph comes from the, and may be of interest:

"A new and exciting opportunity to learn and grow in Christian discipleship is to be launched throughout the United Reformed Church in 2018. In preparation there will be a phase by phase process in which TLS winds down some of what it offers and new transitional opportunities will come into place. The first stage in this process will be that this year (i.e. for the academic year beginning in September 2016) TLS will not enrol any new course members on the Foundation Course.

One year "Gateway" courses on worship, pastoral care, prayer, evangelism, and developing community experiences will continue and will start as usual in September 2016, with a closing date for applications of 31 May.

"The commission envisaged a range of potential ministries in teams, group pastorates, and ecumenical situations."

"In most churches there are fewer services, fewer flourishing organisations, fewer members to visit, and the church is in touch with a smaller segment of society."

"The reformed conviction that all Christians are 'ministers' had often had to struggle against a 'mystique' of the ministry as a class apart." "A local church will have to show special justification for maintaining a single pastorate situation."

"As most people are not now within church life, Christians will find more and more that their opportunities of service are away from 'home ground' in the churches."

Alongside these quotes was this comment: "The intellectual argument...... seemed unassailable, but hearts and minds had not been won."

It was sobering to realise that these words are forty years old, yet they still have a very real ring of truth to them and seem so terribly relevant all of a sudden! By the time you read this, the Cardiff URC churches will have come together for an important meeting, called by our Moderator, to consider our way forward, because of the real lack of available ordained ministers.

I hope we manage to do more than repeat what was said in the 1970's, not only for me to be positive in my essay, but so that we find the way to reform and become the future of the URC in Cardiff.

KIN - Together

At our KIN meeting last month we urgently discussed how we in Beulah could find a way to help the plight of refugees in Europe. We have already had collections for the Red Cross and UNICEF, but we wondered if there was a more practical way we could help. Shortly afterwards we heard of the Refugee Community Kitchen and its links to Cardiff.

Steve Garrett, who founded Riverside Community Market in 1998, had been to Calais and Dunkirk along with a friend Ben Moss who runs a stall at the market. They had decided to collect food and money at the market each week, and then to deliver the food to France in support of the Refugee Community Kitchen.

Steve says, "We are not a political organisation, we are just human beings helping other human beings People have been incredibly generous. Companies are interested in what we are doing and they have been donating food and money, as well as people in the community."

This seemed the perfect opportunity for Beulah to get involved and to help in some practical way.

We will be collecting the following food items on Sundays 6th and 13th March, and the money raised at the Easter Breakfast will be donated to the RCK. Tinned Items: Tomatoes, Tomato Puree, Tuna, Sardines, KidneyBeans, Chick Peas Other Items: Tea, Coffee, Lentils, Basmati Rice, Raisins, Sultanas.

The money collected will go towards:

- food for the kitchens and food distribution
- gas for the cooking stoves
- creating and equipping community kitchens

• maintaining the vehicles used for food distribution.

In response to an email I sent, I received the following information about the RCK...

REFUGEE COMMUNITY KITCHEN

is a grassroots charity creating food projects for refugees in Europe.

We came together in the autumn of 2015, with our collective experience in catering, chef-ing and production industries, to create a kitchen to provide healthy, hot meals for the refugees in Europe throughout the winter and beyond. As a group we have felt compelled to be pro-active to ease the suffering that we have witnessed on our doorstep. We feel that food not only nourishes but also has the power to lift the spirits and connect people in times of severe hardship.

Initially, we raised money for essential equipment and transport costs and built an off-site industrialsized kitchen to support the existing kitchens and other community projects in the Calais Jungle. After an incredible response we are now up and running with a fullyestablished kitchen wholly staffed by volunteers who create over 2000 meals a day with food that is largely donated.

We have also created a strong food distribution system that sends out packages daily to the refugees in both Calais and Dunkirk.. These give individuals and families the ingredients they need to cook for themselves which not only provides meals but also much needed dignity throughout the different communities living side by side in the camps.

Additionally, we have created five community kitchens in the camps for people to cook their own food. These kitchens have been placed in areas where we found people that, for many reasons, would not come forward to the hot food distribution points. Our aim is to create as many of these community kitchens as needed with the hope of creating a focal point for people to come together and cook the food that they need most.

Our projects are on-going and will be adapted to fit the demand of this very new and ever-changing situation in Europe. As there are no signs of resolution in the near future, our next imminent project is to create mobile industrial kitchens to support the needs of refugees further afield in Europe

Up to now we have had extraordinary support from wholesalers, head chefs, donors and volunteers but our financial, equipment and food needs to keep the current projects afloat are large and on-going.

We hope this letter explains what we are achieving and inspires you to get involved further.

The RCK is now expanding into the camp in Dunkirk, and the following is taken from one of their latest postings online

On to the next phase in this humanitarian crisis... DUNKIRK...... We now have the opportunity to extend the successful self catering model of community kitchens and communal spaces in the new camp in Dunkirk. This camp will be set up by MSF (Medicines Sans Frontier) and is due to open in early March. The camp will house 2500 refugees from 5+ nations and is being built now. MSF are working very closely with a number of volunteer groups to help make this camp work for the refugees who will be living there until they find refuge and can start to try and live a normal life again.

R.C.K / F.Y.P (Refugee Community Kitchen / Future Youth Project) together with ABC (Aid Box Convoy) and AIA (Artists in action) have designed and will be constructing and managing the new kitchens and communal seating spaces. We now have this great opportunity to make a big difference from the start by building spaces where the residents can cook for themselves and their families, and have a space where they can sit and eat. We will be building 5 male/mixed communal kitchens / communal areas seating over 100 people each and 6 x Women's seating over 40 people each. There will be 40 x Rocket Stoves and 12 big outdoor burners to heat the communal spaces.

We will be needing more vehicles and infrastructure for this next stage.. so we need your help again. Please support our efforts by registering your interest in getting involved. Be it by coming with your building skills and tools when we need you, donations of the items we need to build/cook or by simply donating your hard earned money. With the love and efforts of many we shall help achieve dignity and full bellies..
