Quite a number of us have also chosen to spend some valuable time in and around Cardiff, sometimes with friends or family. Not everyone who would like to be able to travel. The staycation can sometimes be the only choice given the very steep increase in the price of holidays during the Summer break. Ill health or the loss of a loved travelling companion can also throw up different barriers to longed for journeys.

For those of us lucky enough to travel for our Summer holidays, we almost always do so out of choice. For some it's the draw of a new country, language, culture and cuisine, for others it's time to be with loved ones, away from the hustle and bustle of everyday life. Happiness can be reading a book in a caravan whilst the British weather does its worst or

exploring a remote sun-kissed hillside village before a dip in the hotel pool. We travel for the weather, to visit family and friends old and new and to broaden our horizons.

We should spare a thought, however, for those for whom travel is not a choice. Those fleeing war, persecution, famine and conflict. They won't be sat on a comfy train with a coffee from the buffet car, in their own car listening to their favourite Summer songs on the radio or enjoying the thrill of an aeroplane flight. They will be walking, for miles and miles and miles. They will be packed into small trucks and large lorries with little air in sweltering conditions. They will be taking their chances on unsafe boats and overloaded dinghies. It always amazes me that, when we fly to our Summer holiday destination, we are no doubt passing over the heads of tens of thousands in need who'd give anything, indeed everything, for such a safe and comfortable passage.

They don't crave the change and experiences some of us are seeking through our travels. They didn't ask for the circumstances they are escaping from. They long for the security and certainty of an assured roof over their head, food in their bellies and a safe place for their children to play and grow up in. So little to ask for in a world which is so, so very rich.

Unlike refugees, most of us travel with the full knowledge that home is there waiting for us with its familiarity, comforts and security. Whilst stuck in traffic on the M4 on the way back to Cardiff, I asked what everyone was looking forward to most about being home. For Eva it was seeing her cuddly toys, for Jonathan it was catching up with his friends and for Hollie it was

the comfort of her own bed! As Dorothy said, there's no place like home.

Change is fun and exciting, but normally only when we are in control of it. When change happens to us, as it does in the extreme case to refugees, it becomes a terrifying ordeal. The loss of control and freedom of choice is one of the worst punishments that you can inflict on a person. When we experience change which we don't want, in our working lives, in our relationships, in church or in our personal circumstances, it can make us anxious and afraid. There's such a thing as 'change fatigue' which affects even the most avid 'change junkie'.

The Bible has some famous journeys of change and experience within it, indeed it is full of travel, often unwanted. Mary and Joseph travelled to Bethlehem, even though Mary was heavily pregnant. The Israelites flee from slavery and journey for generations, lost in the wilderness.

There are also journeys of hope and discovery. Jesus journeys throughout the Bible lands teaching and showing all those he meets God's love and bringing them the gift of divine change. After the resurrection, Paul travels all over the Roman world, spreading the Good News and changing people's lives forever.

So, is change good or bad? A friend once said to me that he thought for people to thrive, they needed to be like sharks. Not as in the Jaws movies, but many sharks have to keep swimming or else they suffocate and die. I think there is an element of this and the journey does reveal many things about our nature and character which the destination cannot, but I think a rest can also sometimes be just what is needed too!

CHURCH NOTES

The Transition Process Continues

This month I want to use the notes to update you on what has been happening over the summer with the transitional process. A number of people have been working very hard on our behalf through the summer weeks, and we are grateful to them for this. Their dedication shows how important Beulah, and its future, is to us all.

The Booklet With this edition of Crossroads you should receive a copy of the booklet which has been produced as a response to the consultation exercise earlier this year. It is a way of appreciating all the effort that you put into sharing your thoughts, ideas and emotions about Beulah, and I hope you will read and treasure it, as it represents an important stage of the journey we are on. I would like to thank Lesley Richards and Eleri John for the enormous amount of time and effort they have put into collating the information and producing this document for us.

The Next Steps.... So what happens next? As Lesley and Eleri say in the booklet, some things that you have suggested can be implemented fairly easily and quickly, and we will try to do so as soon as we can. However... the transitional process which we agreed to a year ago, along with other URC congregations in Cardiff, is on-going, and is not so quick

and easy. For Beulah, we now need to extract **significant themes** from the data you have given us, and produce **concise statements** around the themes. Once these are agreed by Church Meeting, the next step will be to draw up **proposals** about how we see Beulah fulfilling its future mission in the context of shared ministry. We have to keep in mind through all this the current and likely ministerial situation in Cardiff, so that our vision and mission aims will be clear about what any ministerial resources can help us to do. It is a new way of thinking, perhaps, for many of us, especially when the outcome seems unclear. But we are making steps along the way, and the responses to the consultations, along with how we are getting along since Peter went, must give us hope and strength that God has need of us here, and that we can travel this way together, as we discover who or what God is calling us to be.

Church Meeting A small group from within the Transitional Huddle (Duncan Pugh, Derek Evans, Marion Williams and myself) are now going through the data and will identify the main themes and statements for Church Meeting to consider. This may be ready for Church Meeting on **September 18**, but all the work done will be shared with you at that point. If at all possible, please do come to Cont. p.3

This is an edited version of a beautiful letter from Dewi Lewis about his illness– we wish him well in his continuing treatment.

LOCUSTS:

That is, Cancer cells

Locusts, we are told, have always been beset by consumption. They remain so but now in the form of cancer cells, invading and consuming indiscriminately. Over the last six months there have been such remarkable developments. It is what I want to share with you and also to thank you for your calls, enquiries and good wishes. The locusts arrived entirely uninvited and settled in droves on every bone. Visiting many clinics in turn, I have found how numerous the resources, how dedicated the staff and how effective the treatments now available. This is a story worth sharing. Also there are informal clinics with key roles day by day - home, close family and wider ones; their support and prayers. So pain is rarely felt. That is a blessing. My Clinic is a gem. It is at Felindre Cancer Hospital - a busy and cheerful place. There is more on offer than treatment: one-to-one sessions, group talks, share stories, laugh. Spot on. When I think of all the costly equipment, the highly trained doctors, their dedicated commitment - it becomes such an eye-opener. The team is open and honest, telling me that a successful outcome is not assured - the best may be putting the malignant cells to sleep for a while so that the bones could strengthen somewhat. They also stress that the patient has a key role in the recovery.

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The patient's role. This merits a whole page. However ambitious the locusts, there are areas well beyond their reach. These include intentions, hope, aspirations, will, resolve, encouragement, love. For sure, the cancer cells have advantages. Unsurpassed spiritual resources are available for the patients should they be called upon. Recruiting these is often the way of getting the best outcome from the treatment medicine provides. That is what medicine actually does. Good cells are already naturally at work to oppose foreign germs. I refuse to provide accommodation for these aliens in my system as the slightest hint could be interpreted as approval - such is their presumption. "You have no permission. Depart" is all they'll hear. With that, plus Divine endorsement, I hold that a good slice of the fight is in my hands. It continues.

More details of the programme next month.

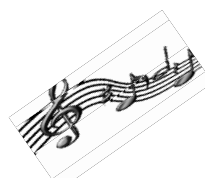

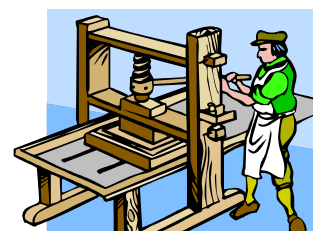
