and beauty; "samanu", a sweet pudding made from wheat symbolising the sweetness of life, and "sabzeh", sprouted wheat grass symbolising rebirth and the renewal of nature. There are also other possibilities – vinegar symbolising patience and immortality, garlic for protection from evil, a goldfish for new life, a candle for light, and painted eggs for fertility.

In Europe, the many pre-Christian traditions and symbols celebrating Spring were absorbed into Easter celebrations of the resurrection of Christ, such as the Easter egg, symbolising new life. While our January New Year celebrations are long gone, the Spring Equinox does feel like a fresh start. As Gerard Manley Hopkins penned in his famous poem "Spring":

"What is all this juice and all this joy? A strain of the earth's sweet beginnings In Eden garden – Have, get, before it cloy, Before it cloud, Christ, Lord and sour with sinning."

So perhaps, as you do a little of your own "house shaking", I wonder what 7 objects you might place on a table to celebrate Spring, and a new beginning. As Christians, the cross is surely our most potent symbol of a new beginning, the new life Christ has made possible for each of us.

He said: "I feel weak in the mornings when I walk to school. I feel lethargic, but I am excited to go to school because I will eat here, and learn."

Chimza is top of his class and has been every year since he started school. However, as the eldest male living in the household, he feels duty-bound to help support the family and is adamant that he would not be at school if it weren't for the phala (porridge).

"When I eat the phala I get the strength to eat, study, walk home, and work."

"If there was no phala, I would have left school, because I know when I am hungry I cannot listen properly, I cannot learn. I would like to finish my education and become a doctor. I would like to help my people - the people around my village - to see a doctor in hospital faster."

Chimza's academic achievements show he is right to be ambitious. Thanks to your generosity, he and thousands more children have the chance to realise their dreams. On behalf of the 1,667,067 children who currently receive Mary's Meals, I thank you from the bottom of my heart.
