Martha, David, Derek, Andrew and I were able to connect by Skype (other Apps are available) and will continue to use this to plan for the next weeks ahead.

KIN History

I was asked to include some informaiton about the history of KIN - so people would know where the name originated from and its values. Marg Jones kindly volunteered to do this for me many thanks.

The Beginning of KIN

Around 1960 Mrs.Oldfield Davies, a member of Beulah, spoke to the whole church about "Welsh Friends of a World in Need", an organisation which helped refugees in Europe after the war. John Rhys was its secretary. She suggested that Beulah might like to help. This was agreed so Kindred in Need (KIN) was formed.

Since then a tremendous amount of money has been raised in response to many needs.

It was suggested that we adopt a refugee family mother (Helene) and her daughter (Waltraud who was 8yrs old) which we did. Money we sent them helped them to buy all sorts of needs, including a wardrobe they called Beulah! In 1963 Beulah brought them over to stay for a month. We tried to learn a bit of German. but in the end they spoke German, we spoke English and used a dictionary to help out. It worked very well!.

Many members entertained them. After the visit we helped them until they got onto their feet. Some years later Helene married Jacob who had lost his leg during the war. Waltraud grew up and married Rudi and they had a son called Thomas. He grew up and married Daniela and they now have a little daughter called Nina - so Waltraud is now a grandmother! We still hear from them at Christmas.

A little bit of help at the right time made a lot of difference!

KIN has since helped many in many ways.

Musings from the Manse

Dear Friends,

April 2020

We have become news junkies. If we are not busy, we are watching the news channels to see what the latest information is in relation to Covid 19. Not particularly healthy you might say, but it is our current practice.

As we watch, we also read articles about the pandemic. There is so much to take in, to process, to try to make sense of what the news, the conditions of our world, mean for us today and mean for us tomorrow. We can only process the information in small bits. We cannot imagine being locked in for two weeks much less 12 weeks.

But here we are. Life is filled with questions and uncertainty. Some of us have family members who are ill. Many of us have family members here and around the UK and the world whom we cannot see. We wonder when or if we will be the next to develop some symptoms. We are trying to avoid fearful thoughts that can overwhelm us. What can two ordinary ministers say in such unprecedented circumstances? This is not the last word by any means. but some reflections in this time of crisis.

Remember who you are.

Firstly, you are a beloved child of God. Whatever happens in the days and weeks ahead, you are not alone. God is with you. God loves you. "The Lord is our shepherd" who is with us in this valley of deepest darkness. (Another option for the translation of the Hebrew which we usually translate as "the valley of the shadow of death".)

Remember who we are. Secondly, you are a follower of Jesus. Jesus lived in a world that was dominated by an unjust political system. He encountered people who lived in isolation because of their illnesses. He found ways to feed people who were hungry and had limited resources. We are followers of Jesus Christ. Fear is not our motivator. Love is our motivator. We are not asking anyone to put themselves at risk, but we are asking that we all show love to those around us. Can we look out for neighbours in need? Can we ask for help from the church where there are people prepared to shop for us and help in other ways? Find ways to act in a loving manner in keeping with the teachings of Jesus. We are coordinating a list of people who can help those who need shopping or other jobs done. If you want to help or need help, someone in your church can put you in touch with Shelagh Pollard who is coordinating this list.

Remember who we are. Thirdly, love is our guide. Pause in the midst of this craziness, pray, allow Love to envelope you, pushing the fear aside. Take a deep breath, remember the community of faith that embodies God's love for you. We are still here for each other. Ring someone. Text someone. Write someone a letter. Find a way to connect safely. Share the love. If you want to talk to someone for any reason, you are welcome to contact us:

Finally, remember—despite the physical distance we are connected as brothers and sisters in Christ. We pray, we love, we put one foot in front of the other, getting through today, trusting God for tomorrow. "Church" is more than the building; it is the connection we still share in Christ.

Our family of faith gives us these words in times of crisis: "Guide me, O Thou Great Jehovah, pilgrims through this barren land. I am weak but Thou art mighty, hold me with Thy powerful hand." May God guide us and comfort us in this strange time.

"Winter in a tent is hard."

Late last year UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency, aimed to support 3.88 million refugees and internally displaced people in Syria, Iraq, Lebanon, Jordan and Egypt to cope with the harsh winter weather ahead. Tens of thousands of Syrians who were displaced due to fighting in north-east Syria, as well as around 12,000 Syrian refugees, sought safety in Iraq where temperatures were expected to plummet. Many of the vulnerable refugee and displaced families expressed fear and dread to UNHCR ahead of what would be, for many, their ninth winter away from home, while struggling to keep their families warm amid poverty and dwindling resources.

Important waste update.

Cardiff is moving to a new, weekly, kerbside-collection which will see all household waste picked up at the same time. If there is space in your black bin you can put small amounts of garden waste in there also. (There will be no separate garden waste collection)

Collection days for your area will remain the same, but the way waste is handled is changing to help manage the impact of COVID-19 and ensure the wellbeing of both residents and the workforce.

Starting on Monday, March 30th, all residents who have a black wheelie bin must put their food waste and hygiene waste (nappies/medical waste etc) into the black bin for collection. Please do not use your food caddy. Collections will be on the normal day for your area.

Residents living in areas which don't have black wheelie bins must put hygiene waste (nappies/ medical waste etc) in their red-striped bags for general waste. Food waste in bag areas should continue to go into your food caddy to stop animals and birds scattering food waste across streets.

Recycling collections will continue as normal and recycling bags should be put out weekly at the same time alongside other waste.

All residents, wherever you live in Cardiff, are asked to continue to recycle as normal, to rinse out their recycling and to put the correct recyclables in their green recycling bags.



The Cardiff & Penarth Pastorate

Practical help during the coronavirus pandemic As normal life and activities are put on hold to keep us safe, we recognise that all of our congregations have vulnerable members for whom this will raise significant difficulties. As Christian communities, we want to do all that we can to help one another.

To organise this, I need your help please:

1. If you need some practical help, (getting shopping, picking up prescriptions, posting letters, etc.) please let me know, either directly or ask someone to contact me on your behalf.

I will need your

- name
- address (with postcode)
- phone number (preferably a mobile number)
- your permission to share these details with a trusted volunteer from your church or one of the others in the pastorate
- a brief description of the help you need.

I will then put you in touch with a volunteer who lives near to you and you can sort out details between you.

- 2. I am compiling a list of possible volunteers from all the churches who might be able to offer help in practical ways. I am already collecting names and I hope that the list will grow in the next couple of weeks. If you might be able to help in this way, please let me know as soon as you can. I will need your
- name
- mobile phone number
- postcode (I hope to match needs with a volunteer who is near)

I will assume that if you give me these details, you are happy for me to use them in contacting someone looking for help.

At this stage I've no idea how many volunteers we'll have as most folk in our congregations are over 70. Neither do I know what needs may emerge. It's therefore possible that the system will need tweaking. If you have any ideas how this might be improved, please let me know.

And just in case I fall ill, Martha will hold a copy of the list of volunteers ...

Keep safe, and be assured that your friends from all 6 churches are supporting you with their prayers and, where possible, their practical help.
