Dear Friends,

t is Lent—that time when we I generally give up something. When we 'give up' for Lent, we hope that our sacrifice will enable us to open our hearts and minds to encountering God.

Yet as many have said, this Lent is different because we have spent a year sacrificing. We have worked longer hours as colleagues have been off with stress or illness. We have stayed at home, not visited friends and family, failed to see grandchildren grow, in person. We have not been in church for our usual gatherings. We haven't met our friends for coffee. We have lost lots of little rituals which give our lives rhythm and meaning. All our sacrifices have been so that we, and others, might have life. (That sounds very scriptural, doesn't it?)

So entering Lent with this background, it doesn't feel like the time to encourage anyone to give up anything. On the other hand, might we take on something new? Maybe, but we have all done a lot of that this year too. Even if we haven't subscribed to the idea of learning something new in lockdown, many of us have learned new things about technology. Just as 'google' had long ago become the word for doing an internet search whether you used the Google search engine or

you?) Zoom is likely to become the word for having a virtual meeting—even if we use another 'platform' like Microsoft Teams. We imagine there are other things you have learned—maybe about yourself; about climate change; about your neighbourhood? So encouraging people to take up something new, to create a new habit, does not seem appropriate either this year.

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1 March is the day of Dewi Sant. As you all know, he said, 'Be joyful, keep the faith, and do the little things that you have heard and seen me do.' Maybe his words can guide us through Lent.

Be joyful—find things that give us joy. Joy can come from listening to the birds sing, from seeing our family on the computer or phone, from a joke shared with a delivery driver, from gathering old photos and putting them in an order to tell our story with someone in the near future. Joy can come from a good meal, a short walking noticing the changes of season, a phone call. Be joyful in whatever ways work for you.



WHITTAKER LOUNGE REFURBISHMENT

Work in respect of a refurbishment of the Whittaker Lounge has been ongoing for quite some time and this is to provide an update.

In 2019 a group was estab-

lished to look at the replacement of the existing two small Tassimo machines which are used to dispense premium (cappuccinos coffees and lattes). Concerns had been expressed as to the recycling of used capsules and the extent to which arrangements were consistent with Beulah's eco-credentials. A specification of requirements was agreed and, following extensive research and visits, a decision was taken to acquire a particular (commercial) device. In relation to refurbishment plans, it was recognised at the time that installation would necessitate major changes to the kitchen area given the weight, dimensions and associated issues, as well as the siting of existing equipment. This would include replacement of many kitchen units. Matters ground to a

In 2020, I was asked to coordinate the work of a group looking at the refurbishment of the lounge. Our brief was quite broad, namely to refresh the present lounge image. Valuable work had been done prior to my arrival on the scene, and my first objective was for the group to all agree a specification of requirements. We evaluated and costed a number of options and after, detailed discussions, re-

halt with the arrival of the pan-

demic.

commended the following option.

This involves upgrading the existing lounge and kitchen unit configuration (not replacing the latter) with a view to achieving the objective of addressing the need to refresh the lounge image. The work includes improvements to the current decor, lighting improvements, curtains, flooring and seating provisions, together with replacement of the existing worktops in



the kitchen area to provide a more hygienic surfacing. Also, to provide a small 'coffee-bar' arrangement to the side of, and integrated into, the existing kitchen area. It is also hoped to provide a suitable framing of the Alison Fear tapestry, before rehanging, and some upgrading of kitchen equipment and crockery

As part of our work, further investigations were undertaken into the recycling of the Tassimo capsules, and that concluded that revised disposal/recycling arrangements, working with a commercial business, would meet Beulah's eco requirements therefore not necessitate the costly replacement of existing kitchen units

Our recommendations were first considered by the Finance

Committee and subsequently approved by Elders.

The project group shares the view of many in respect of the advantages of undertaking refurbishment work whilst the lounge is closed thereby facilitating re-opening the lounge at the earliest opportunity. Independent advice has been sought and it is now clear that, consistent with Welsh Assembly requirements, work can proceed provided it is done so in a COVID-safe manner and we

must first complete a risk analysis. Detailed project/work plans are now being prepared by the project group and we will then meet with potential contractors, get quotes, select contractors etc. prior to work actually starting. Dates ill depend on the availability of

will depend on the availability of those involved.

Completion of this refurbishment work does not imply the Lounge will then reopen. The actual re-opening of the lounge itself depends on very many other factors, notably those which are COVID-related, and which are not the responsibility of the refurbishment project team. These include the ability and willingness of the (almost 40) volunteers, upon whom serving clients depends, to return to the lounge. There are many other factors and the Whittaker Lounge Committee is aware of relevant issues and will, of course, discuss these with church leaders and those affected at the earliest opportunity.

Members of the Pastorate were again invited to remain in the meeting if they so wished. Approximately 40 people attended and Andrew asked everyone to share a few minutes of silence to remember those friends we had lost recently and their families.

Re-opening of Buildings. We had written to all our regular Canolfan clients to let them know that we would not be reopening until Easter at the earliest and asked them to let us know if and when they would like to return. Also, continuing with our practice of reviewing worship arrangements at each Elders' meeting in the light of current URC and Welsh Government guidelines, he reported that the decision had been taken that no worship would take place in the Church during March.

We are currently looking into the possibilities of streaming services from the Church. The Wifi is now in place and Huw Morgan is kindly researching this with our electronics engineers. Those who would be leading worship in the future would then need to get together to plan the best way forward. In the meantime. Martha and David would be using the interiors of the pastorate churches as background from time to time. However, some people said they found the virtual background distracting.

There was discussion on a memorial service at some time in the future to remember all those we had lost since the beginning of lockdown in March last year. It was pointed out that, whilst



social distancing remained in place, it could be some considerable time before we would be able to hold such a service with the numbers of people who would wish to attend. Martha said that, in the meantime, she and David were planning to hold a virtual memorial service during March – date to be decided

Elders' Nomination Process. Geraint Richards had presented a paper to Elders on how members of the Leadership Team. Church Life Elders and Pastoral Elders might be called in the future and the possible timeline involved. He was thanked for all his work and a firm proposal would be brought to the next Church Meeting on Sunday 28 February. The question was asked if it would be possible to share the papers prior to Church meeting and we are looking into ways that this might be done.

Youth Worker. Members were reminded that we had been discussing the possible employment of a Youth Worker before Martha and David had joined us but had decided to put this on hold until after ministers had been appointed. Discussions had now resumed and Fiona Liddell had brought a proposal to Elders together with the potential budget. It had become clear during those discussions that only Beulah was in a position to lead on this as other churches, except City URC, either had no children or young people or funds. However, some would be interested to link in from time to time. The options were for a full time, a part time worker, or no appointment at all. The total cost of a full time YW would be c. £30,000 for each of 3 years. It was noted that Synod would be prepared to contribute up to £12,000 p.a. for those 3 years as long as there was an element of regional development involved across the Pastorate. However, there were other possible sources of funding but

Synod would not be prepared to contribute if these were used. So Fiona had kindly agreed to research this further and report back. There would be a strong element of community involvement in the post and there had been considerable support amongst the Eldership. Children and young people remain a priority for Beulah and there was a sense in the meeting that this post too remained a key priority. It was also noted that we had a range of skills and expertise in the congregation on which we could draw to support the work.

Whittaker Lounge. In November 2019 the Church had agreed to a spend of £10,000 on refurbishment of the Lounge but work had been held up because of Covid. However, a small team had been working hard planning the work and had brought an up to date budget proposal of £11,500 to Finance and Elders during this month. The recommendation from Finance Committee to Elders

'That Elders confirm that they are happy for the Lounge Committee Project Group to proceed as above. Hopefully, this will mean that we will be ready to open the Whittaker Lounge to the public as soon as guidelines allow. The Lounge is such an important link with members of the Church and the wider community and one which has been very much missed over the past 10 months.'

This was unanimously agreed at the meeting on 8 February.

However, with the current restrictions on the use of our buildings, it was proving difficult to meet. The guidelines state that only *essential* work could be carried out and Duncan Pugh had looked into this and had been told that this was not essential. During discussion, the importance of the Lounge

being available for use as soon as it was allowed was recognised, although, with social distancing in place the numbers allowed would be very low. It was also noted that many of the volunteers who staffed the Lounge were in the vulnerable age group and it was confirmed that the Church would be very mindful of their welfare. In the meantime, the group would continue with their planning via Zoom and Duncan would seek further advice on access for potential tradesmen to obtain estimates, and ultimately to carry out and finish the work.

<u>Finance</u>. Barbara reported that the Church had made a substantial loss during 2020 but she would be bringing more detail and a draft Budget for 2021 to the Church meeting on the 28 Feb.

Synod Draft Environmental Policy. Synod would be voting on this important item at its meeting on 6 March. However, it was pointed out that it would need considerable funding and effort to implement the policy once it was passed.

General. Everyone was encouraged to go and see what had already been done to illustrate the Show the Love campaign and to add their hearts to those already there. Thanks to Marianne Barwise for her work on this and to our artist, Jo Jones, for her input.

One suggestion during the meeting was that we should focus on what we CAN do during this difficult time. Unanimously agreed.

Andrew thanked everyone for their participation and reminded them about the Church meeting following morning worship on **Sunday 28 February**. The first item on the Agenda would be: Pancakes – how many did you manage to eat?!!

NB This will now be held on Sunday, March 7th.








SHOW THE LOVE
