In July we enjoyed being together at our annual family BBQ and shared pictures of the potatoes we had grown (thank you Mr Potato Head!).



#### TO HOPE AND ACT WITH CREATION

## It is better to give than to receive...

One of those Bible verses you may have learnt as a child, and which as a child, I for one wasn't entirely convinced by!

But today, when I ride tandems at Pedal Power with blind or partially sighted friends, I couldn't put it better. Never has 'volunteering' been so rewarding and so much fun!

There is no stereotype for participants. As pilots (on the front of the bike) we have both women and men, and the same as stokers (on the back). Age is no barrier - at present the dozen or so members of the group range from 20 something to 80 something! Lycra is not required – in fact it's pretty rare.

We ride for up to a couple of hours every second Saturday morning, from Pedal Power's base in Pontcanna Fields to places like Cosmeston Lakes or St Fagans. A stop for coffee - and often cake! - is an essential part of every ride. The social aspect of the group is almost as important as the bikes. I find the trust shown by our blind and partially sighted friends is quite remarkable, and the lessons it has taught me about communication and inclusivity are too many to count.


This is just one way Pedal Power is enabling people to fulfil their cycling potential - it is an amazing, friendly, inclusive place where everyone really is welcome. To ride a bike, or a trike, or a tandem, or to have lunch or (very good) coffee, take part in art workshops - the list goes on!
